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1 first and a second. All those in favor. 2. CHORUS: Aye. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? 3 4 The minutes are approved as provided. Before we move into resolutions, I believe our CEO has a 5 presentation for us. 6 7 MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, thank you. presentation actually ties into the first reso. 8 9 This is our youth development reso. We have 10 been working two years, three board retreats, a 11 lot of committee meetings, and a lot of effort 12 with staff and Board leading up to today. So, I 13 just want to go through a quick PowerPoint of where we come from, the work that has been 14 15 behind the scenes to get to this point. 16 we're almost at the finish line of the next 17 five-year cycle. So, Wanda, if you can pull up 18 the PowerPoint. Next page. 19 All right, so the past several years we had -- we talked about the Board retreats. We -- we 2.0 21 -- the -- the last three Board retreats really 22 had been giving staff direction about funding 23 opportunities, where to invest, and the staff 2.4 has carried out the Board's directives, and also

to improve our solicitation process. We have

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1 put all stakeholders under an umbrella leading 2. up to this process. We have a parent survey that went out to all the parents, with 2000 3 4 parents and caregivers giving us feedback. 5 We conducted 27 focus groups with parents and youth, and we also focused -- had 28 youth -6 7 - one -- and we'll talk about later. We have -- we 8 9 have opportunity that we've never funded in this 10 area, but how do we reach those kids who may not 11 be in school, may be in and out of the -- the 12 justice system or the foster care system, and 13 how do we reach the hard-to-reach youth and 14 provide them the necessary programs and giving 15 the providers the flexibility to meet those kids 16 where they are at. We also conducted a provider 17 input session in July 2022, with over 500 18 community stakeholders in attendance giving us also feedback. 19 2.0 The -- the next slide we go into the --21 just the community engagement efforts. 22 throughout the years, we -- we've learned 23 through every process is how to get out to the 24 community and let them know the RFP is coming.

The -- the large organizations, the people in

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our system, the new people, individuals who want to get into our system, so we --- we went out there and went to 37 different collaborative meetings, as well as the engagement team worked with the programs team. So, anyone who requested information, we went to meet with them, how to apply for RFP. Again, there was a lot of people who requested a prior -assignments, and we went out there and met everyone and answered everybody's questions.

And then the -- the area that we're very proud of -- next slide -- is the new population that we added for this cycle. It's a system involving youth who are disconnected from school and work. With -- with the board's guidance, we undertook the -- the efforts -- this new development cycle to explore new ways to expand our supports for youth involved in the child welfare system or the juvenile justice system, or those students who are just disconnected from school and work with no programs serving them.

In addition to the 27 research-led focus groups I talked about before, we also met with more than two dozen leaders in their respective fields ranging from faith-based community

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1 leaders, leaders of CBOs who know how to 2. effectively reach these youth, grass --3 grassroots community organizers who work with a army of parents to reach troubled teams, experts 4 5 in the juvenile justice system, psychologists, experts related to how to best serve prosecuted 6 7 youth, as well as DCF. And those listening sessions really prepared us for this RFP. 8

And then the reviewer training. So, as we are now in five-year cycles and we also have a lot of new staff the last several years was how to train our staff. So, the last six months, we went on a big training session about the RFP and how to score RFPs, and not only external, we also trained -- and not only internal, but we also have external reviewers. So, any RFP, when individuals apply or organizations apply, they are reviewed by two internal staff and one external reviewer. So, we thank the community because we had an army of external reviewers who were trained.

And for the staff, we have 80 staff
members; every single staff member was trained
through a course of six weeks. We also gave
them homework assignments, came back, gave them

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feedback on the scoring, and it really helped to align the scoring system. Also at -- at the end, we have debriefing meetings. And what a debriefing meeting is that those -- the reviewers review independently, and then they come together collectively in a public setting.

And the public setting is open to the public, and people come and hear, and those providers who are being scored can be in the room or be on Zoom, and hear their scores. The scores are compiled and that's where it gets moved into the funding opportunity. So, we enhanced our internal/external reviewer training, six sessions for internal reviewers over a three-month period. We had a pretraining video for our volunteer committee reviewers, in-person training with assignments and practice sessions, and we also included evaluation for reviewers with feedback.

And here are some of the numbers and the results of where we're at. We continue our efforts to -- it gets -- we're all under continuous improvement, so we continue our efforts in simplifying our application review process, including improved reviewer selection

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We had more than 460 separate reviews training. that were conducted with a -- conducted out of 154 applications submitted, since every application is indi -- individually reviewed by three reviewers.

We -- we were very blessed, again, to recruit a large pool of interested volunteer reviewers. And we -- we trained the whole staff when we trained all the external reviewers. did not use them all, but, as you know, we've just released parenting. We have a parenting RFP going out that we're going to need some reviewers. We have five RFPs going out for our kind of back-end support, our auditing service, our HR service, and that we're going to need reviewers as well.

So, we trained everybody, knowing through the course of the year we'll be using a variety of different people. And we also -- we also met after the funding recommendations. There's -there's a chance to appeal. We had several people appeal, but those appeals were denied because there were no procedural violations, but there was another button to click to come and meet with us and review. So, we're happy to

1 meet with everyone. We met with 27 2. organizations, and some of those organizations we met with more than once. And staff, for the 3 last three weeks, have been meeting day and 4 5 night with all the people who took -- were approved and those people who were not approved. 6 7 Our intern -- our intentional efforts the last several months -- the last couple of years 8 9 -- the last several months has truly paid off. 10 We are -- we are now recommending the largest 11 youth development investment -- investment in 12 the history of the children's trust. 13 So, a couple of highlights; this cycle new 14 agencies to the initiative. So, let me back up 15 -- through last cycle -- when we went through 16 last cycle five years ago, we looked at some of 17 the narrative out there, about it was hard to 18 get trust funding, we didn't have a grant 19 writer, big, small, university, not university, 2.0 but the reality was, it was -- the barrier to 21 entry was getting into the trust ecosystem. 22 People in the trust ecosystem, usually continue 23 to get funding. There was a barrier to 2.4 entrance -- a barrier to entry for new providers. 25 So, we worked on that. Three -- three

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cycles ago there was 8 percent probability of those -- 8 percent success rate to get into our system, last cycle was at 59, and this cycle was 78 percent of the new funders were able to get into our ecosystem. In addition to the overall -- oh, that is 24 new programs, if you look at the number; 78 percent was 24 new programs.

In addition to the overall increased success by new agencies, 88 percent of the applicants that were previously funded as subcontracts, so many of these were subcontractors working through somebody else, were able to apply, and they are now fully funded as the lead agency. And finally, what we're very proud about, we had efforts the last several years over the small CBO; 100 percent of our small CBO applicants who applied received trust funding per the recommendations.

And the next slide just shows a geographic expansion. So, as a result, the RFP called out several census designation places for expansion, and these are places we want a larger footprint where -- especially those living in poverty.

Our goal through the competitive solicitation is to ensure that we have services throughout

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Miami-Dade County. And the slides here show -where the yellow dots in the pro -- currently -our -- our youth development after school and summer footprint, those are where the yellow dots, and the purple background highlighting the areas designated for expansion. These maps are listed as part of YD RFP for applicants to consider.

And the recommendations before you represent an overall -- an overall increase in after school and summer programs from 484 sites to 682 sites. This is -- includes a 41 percent expansion in -- in the identified priority This map also shows expansion areas in areas. yellow and includes after school, summer, and full-day time frames. And if you look at the size of the dots, the size of the dots are correlated to the number of slots.

And just the last page; I just want to thank the team. It really has been this board, 80 staff members, and the community working exceptionally hard to get to this point. This is our largest investment. We are now setting ourselves up, if the Board approves -- by the way, we took this also to the Finance Committee 1 this morning because we wanted the Finance 2. Committee to be aware. It's coming to Programs Committee and the full Board on April 17th. 3 Ιf 4 the Board approves on April 17th, this will set 5 up our next five-year cohort, with 36,000 slots for kids that will be in after school and summer 6 7 Thank you, Madam Chair. programs. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim. So, 8 with that presentation, we will move into 9 10 resolutions, and I'm going to punt to Karen 11 Weller, who will present Resolution 2023-A. 12 MS. WELLER: Good afternoon, everyone, I 13 apologize for being late. Anyway, Resolution 14 2023-A: Authorization to negotiate and execute 15 contracts, with 143 providers identified herein, 16 to deliver high-quality after-school programming 17 for 17,413 elementary, middle, high school age 18 children and youth and summer programming for 18,597 elementary, middle, and high school age 19 2.0 children and youth, in the total amount not to 21 exceed \$76,662,000, for year-round and school-2.2 year programs. 23 The contract term will be 12 months, 24 commencing August 15th of 2023 and ending 25 August 14th of 2024. And for summer-only

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      programs, the contract term will be a term of
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      six months, commencing March the 1st of 2024 and
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      ending
      August 31st of 2024. Each with four remaining
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      annual renewals, subject to annual funding
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      appropriations --

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1 services are by far the most intensive. And 2. note that this contract renewal considers the additional funding added in 2022/23 contract by 3 4 way of an amendment to support increase staffing 5 costs and for teacher quality. 6 Feedback/comments from the committee? 7 MS. Resolution 2023-C: 11 12 Authorization to negotiate and execute a 13 contract with Florida Introduces Physical 14 Activity and Nutrition to Youth (FLIPANY) for 15 after-school snacks and meals, in a total amount 16 not to exceed 600,000 -- or \$600,000. 17 For a term of 12 months, commencing October 18 1, 2023, and ending September 30, 2024, with two 19 remaining contract renewals. May I have a 2.0 motion, please? 21 MS. GIMENEZ: Gimenez. 2.2 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you and a second? 23 MR. BAGNER: Second. 2.4 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Second is -25 - is Bag -- Bagner. Are there any recusals?

1 Hearing no recusals. Moving to discussion. 2. The trust requires all after school and 3 summer programs to provide participating 4 children with food that meets the United States 5 Department of Agriculture (USDA) Nutritional 6 Program -- Nutrition Program requirements. 7 FLIPANY is the after-school snack and meal provider for programs not located in a Miami-8 9 Dade County public school or a licensed 10 childcare center, since those locations are 11 already served through separate food programs. 12 FLIPANY provides nutritious lunches, 13 snacks, and supper to 91 trust-funded after-14 school sites for children and youth in grades K 15 to 12, and also offers administrative services 16 for the relevant agencies to help them meet the 17 requirements of the after-school meals program 18 funded by the Florida Department of Agriculture and administered by the Florida Department of 19 2.0 Health. 21 Thoughts, observations, comments from the 2.2 committee? Hearing none. All those in favor? 23 CHORUS: Aye. 2.4 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: All right. Are there 25 any opposed? Resolution carries, and that

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1 concludes our resolutions for this meeting. And 2 so, I'll now turn to our CEO. Mr. CEO? MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, thank you. Board of 3 Directors site visit April 12, 3:00 to 4:00 at 4 5 Shenandoah Elementary. We hope you can all join us. Last -- last one was at the COTE. 6 7 was a great event. We had five -- five/six 8 board members show up. We do -- we do value 9 your time and we'll keep it condensed. So, I hope it will be no more than an hour. 10 Champions for Children on April 27th. 11 Ιf 12 you have not RSVPed, please do so. We're doing 13 the table assignments the next couple of weeks 14 and the reservations are now flying in, so we 15

want to make sure all the board members have a seat reserved. The Young Talent Big Dreams finale is going to be at the Miracle Theatre on May 13th at 7:00 p.m.

And lastly, summer camps. You know, summer's coming around the corner. Parents are going to start looking for summer camps. have a great partnership with Miami-Dade County, Miami-Dade County Public Schools, and JCS have been working for months to get one site so parents can go look. So, there'll be a media

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blitz and things popping up. We're trying -we're in the last week of trying to wrap things
up. And you will start seeing a big push from
all four of us with a common theme and common
messaging that we'll start doing the media and
get a push out on the social media channel. So,
we appreciate the work with the county school
system and JCS to coordinate this effort.

And this is our first year coming out this door, and we're going to improve on it year after year. But it really has been -- to have four large organizations work so well together - and we started this several months ago because we know that parents start looking right about now for summer -- summer options. So, we're very proud of that work and you'll see that in the next couple of weeks. Thank you, Madam Chair.
