MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Good afternoon. It's good to see everybody on this rainy Thursday. Welcome to the Program Services and Childhood Health Committee. It's good to see all of you here today. Do we have any public comments?

MS. WELLER: There are no public comments, Madame Chair.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. Thank you. With no public comments, let's move to the approval of the May 4th, 2023 committee minutes. By now, committee members, you will have had an opportunity to review the minutes. And may I have a motion to approve? Thank you, Mary. And a second? Thank you, Dr. Abraham. All those in favor of approving the minutes as laid forth?

COMMITTEE: I.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

The minutes are approved. We're going to move right to resolutions this afternoon. Resolution 2023-A, Authorization to waive the formal competitive procurement process and to negotiate and execute contract renewals with eight providers

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identified herein, for Trust Academy Quality
Supports, in an amount not to exceed \$4,249,893 for
a term of 12 months, commencing October 1st, 2023
and ending September 30th, 2024, with three
remaining contract renewals. Further delegation of
authority to adjust paid providers and some program
components. May I have a motion please?

MS. GIMENEZ: Lourdes Gimenez.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second? Are there any recusals? With no recusals, let's move to discussion. Committee members, as you are aware, the Trust Academy partners provide supports for quality program implementation and fiscal and administrative functions. Partner agencies train and cro -- coach the trust service providers to achieve meaningful and measurable results, consistently deliver high quality services, and to effectively and efficiently satisfy trust contractual expectation.

The -- also, I'll add that the Trust Academy partners conduct initiative specific community awareness outreach and planning policy supports related to family services, youth development, inclusion supports of a couple of areas -- in a couple of areas, as well as organizational capacity

MR. BAGNER: 1 No. 2. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: -- chain delegation? 3 MR. BAGNER: Yeah, the changes. Correct. 4 MS. KOBRINSKI: He's asking about the 5 delegation of authority. MS. FERRADAZ: Oh, okay. So, that's what you 6 7 are talking about -- the delegation of authority? So, pretty much we got advice from our -- from our 8 attorney to add this language because we have some 9 10 pay partner -- partners that were included 11 originally as part of the application that we have to remove -- I mean, to the contract negotiation. 12 13 So, that's the reason we were advised to add this 14 language. 15 So, that -- that explains the MS. KOBRINSKI: 16 procurement waiver. So, they did the competitive 17 This item came to the board with certain process. 18 lead organizations and the paid partners. And then 19 after it came to the board last year, they entered 20 contract negotiations and some of the paid partners 21 changed. 22 So, when it came back to the board, I said 23 this needs to have a procurement waiver because it 24 wasn't the same -- the services that were initially 25 procured. And then additionally, the staff is

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asking for delegated authority in order to change some of the program components that are being funded and the paid partners without coming back to the board to reflect those changes.

MR. BAGNER: Oh, okay. So, that's in the future if they change, right? Is that --

MS. KOBRINSKI: Yes.

MR. BAGNER: Okay.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Leigh. Further discussion from the committee? Hearing none. All those in favor?

MR. BAGNER: Recusal. Bagner, employed by FIU and their paid to shop service.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Secret shop -- shopper

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1 Thank you, Dan. Other recusals? service. Hearing 2. none. Brief discussion? The 2-1-1 Miami helpline is a 24/7 source of information and resources for 3 4 health and human services in Miami-Dade County. And among the services that are provided is a 24 5 hour staffed call center, enhanced advocacy for the 6 most vulnerable call -- callers. 7 And note that this work includes maintenance 8 of an up-to-date, searchable online community 9 10 resource directory. And as you look at the visual 11 that accompanies this resolution, I'd invite you to 12 note that housing is by far the top need expressed 13 along with mental health and substance abuse. 14 Feedback? Conversation from the committee? 15 MS. DIAZ: Ouick question. Do we have any data comparing how mental health was before? Did 16 17 it increase by a lot because of the pandemic? 18 MS. DIAZ: Good question, Lourdes. Gilda? 19 MS. FERRADAZ: Yeah, I suppose so. I can turn to -- I don't think I have the numbers in front of 2.0

us to compare, but we would have to compare with what we used to collect -- you know -- the report previously versus what we have now. But I mean it's -- it's around the country -- like we've seen the increase in mental health needs and -- and

services.

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MS. DONSWORTH: I mean, I can just add I had a recent visit to JCS and they were telling me that the average time now to get a mental health appointment is three months in Miami-Dade County and the referrals they're getting from the school system has gone from 50 to 90 a month.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Mary.

MS. DONSWORTH: Thank you.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Further discussion from the committee? Hearing none. All those in favor? COMMITTEE: Τ.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. Resolution 2023-C, Authorization to negotiate and execute a match contract with Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs for Cultural Arts programs in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000 for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1st, 2023 and ending September 30th, 2024. May I have a motion please? Thank you, Dan.

And a second? Thank you, Karen. Are there any recusals? Hearing no recusals. Moving into discussion. This resolution authorizes match funding for Miami-Dade County Department of

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Cultural Affairs to support nonprofit organizations that provide cultural art programs for children and families across the county.

The county issues competitive grant opportunities throughout the year and provides at least a 100% leveraged funding return for these youth arts education programs. And that's a total of 3.4 million leveraged. The three program areas are youth arts enrichment programs, all kids included, accessible arts experiences for kids, and summer arts and science camps for kids and their acronyms are included also.

And just a -- just a couple of the 2021, 2022 highlights. There were 86 funded programs. 42,547 children and youth were served with 6,245 of those served identifying at least one disability.

Conversation? Discussion from the committee?

MR. BAGNER: Madame Chair just to commend them. 62% kids with disability -- I think is commendable for these kinds of programs and it's -- it's great that they got them in -- that they got those kids involved. So, just wanted to point that out.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Terrific. Okay. All those in favor?

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particular solicit -- solicitation -- excuse me -the Children's Trust conducted 16 focus groups with
more than a hundred parents and considered results
from a community parent survey of nearly 37 -3,700 parents and caregivers of children and youth
of all ages.

Additionally, more than 200 communities.

Excuse me. I think somebody needs to mute. Thank
you. Okay. Additionally, more than 200 community
stakeholders attending a parenting and family
strengthening information -- information provided
input and network -- networking session provided
input. Input was also sought from the juvenile -juvenile justice and dependency systems partners.

As a result of this planning, as well as the board's policy guidance, the solicitation included a goal to expand services. The -- the services are being expanded to -- to make available services during the prenatal period, to also support families with their mental health needs, and fatherhood programs. Any further discussion? Hearing none. All those in favor?

MS. WELLER: Oppose? The motion carries. And I give it back to you, Madame Chair.

Authorization to waive the -- Resolution 2022-E, Authorization to waive the formal competitive 3 4 procurement process and to negotiate and execute 5 contract renewals with 22 providers identified herein, for family and neighborhood support 6 7 partnerships in an amount not to exceed \$13,408,796. 8 And for the Children's Trust to encumber a 9 10 purchase order in the amount of \$500,000 for pooled 11 family stabilizing funding for total amount not to 12 exceed \$13,908,796 for a term of 12 months, 13 commencing October 1st, 2023 and ending September 14 30th, 2024 with three remaining contract renewals. 15 Further -- further delegation of authority to adjust paid providers and some program components. 16 17 May I have a motion please? 18 MR. DUNN II: So moved, Dunn. 19 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second? And do we 2.0 have any recusals? 21 MR. BAGNER: Sorry, I'm -- I -- I was on a 22 roll here. I I'm recusing again. Bagner, employed 23 by FIU. I have a colleague who's funded on this 24 with the Christie house, so I'm going to recuse 25 from this one as well.

1 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dan. Other 2. recusals? Hearing none. Moving into discu --Family and neighborhood support 3 discussion. 4 partnerships offer a comprehensive and 5 individualized support for children, youth, and their families experiencing challenges that may 6 limit them from realizing their total health, 7 social, educational, and economic potential. 8 To date 1,627 families -- and that's 404,151 9 10 individuals have received more than 22,000 hours of 11 services to date. And I'd point out that 12 residential stability is a top need that has been 13 identified inside this work. Feedback? 14 Conversation from the committee? 15 MS. GIMENEZ: I -- I have a question. 16 that in one of the groups, Agape network -- Is that 17 the one down South? I'm on the board of Agape 18 Network -- the foundation board and I just don't 19 know if I need to recuse myself on this. 25 --2.0 children inmates. 21	discussion. In Resolution number 2023-05, This						
22	board approved the Ascend program, which is the						
23	salary supplement program for early learning						
24	educators working in Thrive by Five programs.						
25	Approval of this resolution will amend Resolution						

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number 2023-05 to allow for an amendment to the current contract with the ELC to amend the scope of service to add an additional cont -- contract activity.

With this activity, the ELC will be able to award qualify -- qualifying ascend educators a one-time bonus payment using limited term funds, up to 5 million, available from the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act and the Adminis -- Administrations of Children's and Families. Any further discussion?

MR. BAGNER: Just a comment and clarification. So, this is great. I think it's great to be paying our early childhood teachers more and it's great that there's no budget impact and they could spend money that they have.

Just out of curiosity, is this going to fund bonuses for more teachers or is it just going to the same teachers that are already getting incentives and giving them more incentives?

MS. FERRADAZ: No, to the same teachers that are currently getting incentives that's been vetted to our process. So, it's an additional payment. They will receive an addition to what they're getting from us.

1	So, we just want to make sure we leverage that
2	\$5 million, keeping them in the community to get
3	these qualified individuals.
4	MR. BAGNER: So, I assume there's no way is
5	there not a possibility of trying to also expand it
6	to other teachers?
7	MS. FERRADAZ: Expand? No. No, we're not
8	expanding. Yes, because after I think Pam want
9	to say something, but after since she recused,
10	after we vote, she will.
11	MR. BAGNER: Okay. We'll vote and then and
12	then I'll be curious to hear.
13	MS. WELLER: Okay. Any further discussion?
14	All those in favor?
15	COMMITTEE: I.
16	MS. WELLER: Opposed? The motion carries.
17	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: May I? It's okay for me
18	too. So, the the guidance that came down from
19	the from the division of early learning was
20	rather targeted.
21	And so, while this money was awarded to the
22	Early Learning Coalition, we actually had to write
23	a grant to receive it. And in order to demonstrate
24	need, we used the extensive data that the
25	Children's Trust has has been able to pull

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together over the years in terms of the impact of - you know -- reducing turnover and -- you know -all of the positive things -- you know -- focusing
on also the incentivization of additional education
and so forth.

So, it just made sense. This partner just -partnership just made sense and it was approved by
the division. Thank you.

MR. DUNN II: And not from the expert perspective, but if I could opine my observation. The early childhood learning educators are probably in many ways like the Miami Heat if you will. They don't get the proper recognition coming out of the draft, but -- but they -- but they play a major role in development stages of our children. I get a chance now -- looking at it now, kind of new to the game, if you will -- Ms. Gimenez, as an elementary educator, if you will -- and I get a chance to see what can happen or what the pros and cons could be if that child does not get that foundational skill set at an early stage.

So, I -- I applaud this grant for making it competitive and attractive to those who are already in this field. Of course, ideally speaking, we want to expand it, but we want to make sure that we

1 can salvage what we have at this point. 2. And I'm -- again, I'm not the expert, you are and -- and -- but I just -- I just see the value of 3 4 investing in making it competitive and commensurate 5 with the responsibility that's attached to it. And the early childhood stage is a very critical and 6 7 crucial stage in my opinion. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Certainly. 8 MR. DUNN II: And money's always a crunch. 9 10 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yeah. 11 MR. DUNN II: Yeah. 12 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Absolutely. And Pastor, I 13 appreciate the heat ana -- analogy. However, as a 14 Bost --15 MR. DUNN II: It couldn't come at a better time, could it? 16 17 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: -- However as --18 MR. DUNN II: No pun intended. 19 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: -- However, as a Bostonian 2.0 and a diehard Celtics fans, this has been a very 21 difficult time. Thank you. And I -- I do see our 22 CEO on screen. 23 MR. HAJ: Yes. 24 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Jim, we'll punt to you for 25 the CEO report.

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MR. HAJ: Madame Chair, thank you. And you know, just want to comment before I forget -- the CEO report of the reso that was just passed. Pam, Madame Chair, thank you -- with Rachel. A lot of the executive team, the ELC team and our attorneys who have worked very hard las -- last month. Just to clarify, these \$5 million were going to be returned.

They're -- they're -- they're assessor funds. They're going to be returned. And the team worked very hard to make sure that \$5 million stayed in our community. So, there was a lot of -- this last month -- of people burning the candle both ends to make sure that we spend the money before it gets -- before it needs to be returned. So, I appreciate everybody's hard work. On the CEO report, Battle of Books is going to be June 13th. These are summer camps across Miami-Dade County that will be participating.

The Family Expo -- We have three that will be held before school starts and we -- you know, we learn every year. We are putting these under AC. So, these are going to be venues that have AC, July 22nd, July 29th, and August 5th throughout Miami-Dade County. And we hope as many board members as

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         possible could attend at least one of these events.
