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1 PROCEEDINGS

2 (Recording of the meeting began at 3:30 p.m.)

3 THE CHAIR: Good afternoon. Welcome and thank
4 you for joining us today. Today's meeting speaks
5 particularly well to something that the Children's
6 Trust does very well, and that's spark innovative
7 partnership and engage in unique funding
8 collaborations for the common good. We want to
9 extend a warm welcome today to the collaborators and
10 partners joining us. So welcome, everyone. And to
11 Committee members as well.

12 And speaking of community partnerships, I hope
13 that many of you that are seated here today had the
14 opportunity to attend last Tuesday's Reach Out and
15 Read medical symposium. Reach Out and Read, as
16 you'll recall, is funded locally by the Children's
17 Trust and promotes literacy by incorporating books
18 into pediatric care. And I mentioned this event
19 specifically because our very own Dr. Daniel Bagner
20 presented the key note. A powerful key note that
21 provided insight in the sharing of findings. And to
22 the multiple research projects that he's been
23 conducting since he was a grad student and up until
24 now with his work with Florida International
25 University.

1 Muriel, do we have any public comments?

2 MS. JEANTY: No public comments.

3 THE CHAIR: Okay, thank you. Then let's move on
4 to the approval of the May 9, 2019 Program Services
5 and Childhood Health Committee minutes.

6 Committee members, you will have had an
7 opportunity to review the minutes, its included in
8 your packet.

9 Do I have a motion to approve the minutes,
10 please?

11 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

12 THE CHAIR: Thank you. And a second?

13 MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.

14 THE CHAIR: All those in favor of approving the
15 minutes say aye.

16 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
17 with "aye.")

18 THE CHAIR: Any opposed?

19 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

20 THE CHAIR: The minutes are approved.

21 And now on to the resolutions. It has been said
22 that collaboration done well is a powerful means for
23 funders to amplify their resources. The wealth of
24 the resolutions we bring before you for consideration
25 today certainly exemplify that statement. These are

1 unique opportunities where groups of funders have a
2 shared goal. And by means of this innovative
3 collective impact, the Children's Trust is able to
4 not only target special populations, but also to take
5 the opportunity to fund outside of some of our
6 typical categories.

7 So let's move onto the resolutions. Resolution
8 2019-A: Authorization to negotiate and execute a
9 contract renewal with Miami-Dade County Department of
10 Cultural Affairs, for a local funding match for
11 cultural arts programs in an amount not to exceed
12 \$1,500,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing
13 October 1, 2019 and ending September 30, 2020.

14 May I have a motion, please?

15 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

16 THE CHAIR: Thank you. And a second?

17 MS. LEICHTER: Second, Leichter.

18 THE CHAIR: Are there any recusals?

19 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

20 THE CHAIR: As we move into discussion, I'll
21 provide a few highlights of this resolution. We all
22 know that research consistently demonstrates that art
23 can enhance children's experiences in almost every
24 social and academic standard of achievement. This is
25 a contract renewal for a local match funding to

1 support the competitive grants that the Department of
2 Cultural Affairs issues. This Trust funding match is
3 matched by more than 100 percent. And the funded
4 programs include, Youth Arts Enrichment Programs, art
5 instruction and interventions, healing and expressive
6 arts, in-school and public performances, all kids
7 included, AKI, the mission of which is to increase
8 the number of quality arts experiences accessible to
9 children with disabilities and their families. And
10 above all, promote inclusionary arts for all. Along
11 with the summer arts and science camp for kids, which
12 provides funding for nonprofits that provide
13 underserved children from across the county with
14 opportunities to attend high quality cultural arts
15 and sciences summer camps at little to no cost. And
16 now a quick look at the numbers. The county has
17 awarded 61 grants that serve 47,473 children.

18 Committee members, is there discussion or
19 questions in regard to this resolution?

20 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

21 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

22 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
23 with "aye.")

24 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

25 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

1 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

2 Resolution 2019-B: Authorization to enter into a
3 service agreement with Miami-Dade County for a local
4 funding match to support Miami-Dade Public Library
5 System's STEAM-based programming and academic
6 tutoring, in an amount not to exceed \$150,000.00 for a
7 term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2019 and
8 ending September 30, 2020.

9 May I have a motion, please?

10 MS. LAWTHER: So moved, Lawther.

11 THE CHAIR: And a second?

12 MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.

13 THE CHAIR: Are there any recusals?

14 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

15 THE CHAIR: And a few notes as we move into
16 discussion. Again, this is a local funding match for
17 STEAM-based programming and academic tutoring project.
18 This is a renewal. And note that this project
19 provides access to science, technology, engineering,
20 arts, and math programming, which is often limited in
21 high need neighborhoods. The public library system's
22 Technobus, which is a mobile unit, provides STEAM
23 programming to children and youth in high need
24 neighborhoods free of cost. Trust match funding
25 provides 60 service stops. And additionally, the

1 library provides academic support and tutoring at
2 locations throughout the county at no cost. Trust
3 match funding increases access to academic tutoring
4 by adding 25 tutors and by increasing the number of
5 tutoring sites from 18 to 27, so by 9. And
6 additionally, this match will add to the existing pool
7 of part-time tutors, now at 80, all of whom are
8 certified teachers who provide small group homework
9 help and tutoring. So that's a few notes on the
10 resolution.

11 Committee members, are there questions on this
12 resolution, observations?

13 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

14 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

15 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
16 with "aye.")

17 THE CHAIR: Any opposed?

18 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

19 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

20 Resolution 2019-C: Authorization to negotiate
21 and execute a funder collaboration contract renewal
22 with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Miami, Inc. (BBBS),
23 in an amount not to exceed \$125,000.00 for a term of
24 12 months, commencing October 1, 2019 and ending
25 September 30, 2020.

1 May I have a motion, please?

2 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

3 THE CHAIR: And a second?

4 MS. EYSSALLENNE: Second, Eyssallenne.

5 THE CHAIR: Are there any recusals?

6 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

7 THE CHAIR: As we move into discussion, again,
8 this is a funding collaboration and contract renewal.
9 This resolution supports the Big Brothers and Big
10 Sisters of Miami's efforts to help break the cycle of
11 delinquency and poverty of participating youth through
12 mentorship and family support. This collaboration
13 reaches more than 1,500 youth and families, including
14 special populations, including children with
15 disabilities, children in foster care, and children
16 with incarcerated parents. For every dollar the
17 Children's Trust invests, \$4 is leveraged in return.
18 And you'll note that the cofounders of this project
19 are listed on page 12 of your packet.

20 Discussion, comments about this resolution?

21 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

22 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

23 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
24 with "aye.")

25 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

1 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

2 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

3 Resolution 2019-D: Authorization to negotiate
4 and execute a funder collaboration contract renewal
5 with Miami Homes For All, Inc., to support
6 partnerships to end youth homelessness in Miami-Dade
7 County, in an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for a
8 term of 12 months commencing, October 1, 2019 and
9 ending September 30, 2020.

10 May I have a motion, please?

11 MS. WELLER: So moved, Weller.

12 THE CHAIR: And a second?

13 MS. LEICHTER: Second, Leichter.

14 THE CHAIR: Are there any recusals?

15 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

16 THE CHAIR: Moving into discussion. Again, it's
17 a funded collaboration and contract renewal. Miami
18 Homes For All is dedicated to preventing and ending
19 youth homelessness, which is defined as individuals 13
20 to 24 years of age, unaccompanied by a parent or
21 guardian, who are experiencing housing instability.
22 Miami Homes For All concentrates on advocacy,
23 prevention, and informational services to enhance
24 existing community efforts. The Children's Trust
25 invests \$100,000 in this effort and the Homeless Trust

1 invests \$360,000, which means that for every dollar
2 the trust invests, about \$3.60 is leveraged in return.
3 The Trust funds a operational support and structure
4 for this partnership, which includes about 100
5 agencies working together to end youth homelessness.

6 Committee members, discussion, comments on this
7 resolution?

8 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

9 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

10 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
11 with "aye.")

12 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

13 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

14 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

15 MS. WELLER: Resolution 2019-E: This resolution
16 has been amended from your previous packet.

17 Authorization to negotiate and execute a funder
18 collaboration contract with The Miami Foundation, Inc.
19 to support increased participation in the 2020 Census,
20 in an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for a term of
21 12 months commencing July 1, 2019 and ending June 30,
22 2020 and to enter into a memorandum of understanding
23 with the partners of the Miami-Dade Counts 2020
24 project for the implementation of the Census 2020
25 Fund.

1 Funding in the amount of \$100,000 for this
2 resolution is allocated for the school year 2018/2019
3 and is projected to be available fiscal school year
4 2019/2020.

5 May I have a motion?

6 MS. LEICHTER: So moved, Leichter.

7 MS. WELLER: Second?

8 MS. LAWTHER: Second, Lawther.

9 MS. WELLER: Any recusals?

10 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Recused, Hollingsworth. I
11 work for the Early Learning Coalition.

12 MS. DONWORTH: And recusal, Donworth. I work for
13 United Way.

14 MS. WELLER: All right, moving into discussion.
15 This funder collaboration contract with the Miami
16 Foundation creates a funding pool to support
17 thoughtful community-based outreach strategies, along
18 with countywide campaigns to increase participation in
19 2020 census. The U.S. constitution requires that the
20 residential population of the country be counted every
21 10 years and a complete and accurate count is vital to
22 communities. Census data is used to draw down funding
23 from an array of programs, including road repairs,
24 school improvements, and school programs, and so many
25 more activities. Miami-Dade County has a history of

1 being undercounted in the census completion rate of 70
2 percent as compared to the national average of 82
3 percent. The Children's Trust investment of \$100,000,
4 while other funders will invest \$625,000. For every
5 dollar the Trust invests, over \$6 is being leveraged
6 in return. Contributors to the project are listed on
7 page 17 in your packet.

8 Are there any discussions or questions?

9 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

10 MS. WELLER: Hearing none, all those in favor?

11 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
12 with "aye.")

13 MS. WELLER: Opposed?

14 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

15 MS. WELLER: The motion carries.

16 THE CHAIR: Resolution 2019-F: Authorization to
17 negotiate and execute a contract with the Public
18 Health Trust of Miami-Dade County, d/b/a Jackson
19 Health System, in partnership with the University of
20 Miami Miller School of Medicine, to implement Miami's
21 Injury Free Coalition for Kids, in a total amount not
22 to exceed \$408,000.00 for a term of 12 months,
23 commencing October 1, 2019 and ending September 30,
24 2020.

25 May I have a motion, please?

1 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

2 THE CHAIR: And a second?

3 MR. DUNN: Second, Dunn.

4 THE CHAIR: Are there any recusals?

5 MS. EYSSALLENNE: Recusal, Eyssallenne.

6 University of Miami.

7 THE CHAIR: Other recusals?

8 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

9 THE CHAIR: A few high points as we move into
10 discussion. This resolution is to execute a contract
11 to implement Miami's Injury Free Coalition for Kids.
12 Unintentional injuries are the leading cause of death
13 and acquired disabilities among children age one
14 through adulthood. The Children's Trust funds the
15 Public Health Trust of Miami-Dade County, d/b/a
16 Jackson Health System, in partnership with the
17 University of Miami Miller School of Medicine for
18 countywide injury prevention services. And some of
19 these services include direct injury prevention,
20 capacity building to increase injury prevention
21 knowledge and advocacy for change, media assisted
22 awareness raising, as well as evaluations for self-
23 assessment and for improvement. The project called
24 the Injury Free Coalition for Kids is among the
25 countries most effective injury prevention models with

1 more than 30 cities participating and implementing.
2 And there was also an injury free mobile unit under
3 construction, which is a 40-foot city bus, purchased
4 during the 2018/2019 contract year by way of match
5 funding from the Trust. And again, that's under
6 construction. Services provided by injury prevention
7 experts are done in three most dominant languages here
8 in our county: English, Spanish and Haitian Creole.

9 We've already had a motion, are there any other
10 discussions, observations, please?

11 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

12 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

13 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
14 with "aye.")

15 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

16 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

17 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

18 Resolution 2019-G: Authorization to negotiate
19 and execute a nine-month contract extension with Miami
20 Dade Family Learning Partnership for the Read to Learn
21 Book Club, in an amount not to exceed \$262,500.00,
22 commencing August 1, 2019 and ending April 30, 2020.

23 May I have a motion, please?

24 MS. EYSSALLENNE: So moved, Eyssallenne.

25 THE CHAIR: Second?

1 MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.

2 THE CHAIR: Are there any recusals?

3 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

4 THE CHAIR: Moving into discussion. Again, this
5 is a nine-month contract extension. You'll remember
6 that the Read to Learn Book Club is a community-wide
7 effort to increase early literacy opportunities for
8 three-year-olds. This initiative, now appropriately
9 named Thrive by 5 Book Club, will move on and
10 transition to serve children birth to five in Miami-
11 Dade County, thus expanding services dramatically.
12 The Thrive By 5 Book Club is now being competitively
13 solicited in a contract extension of nine months.
14 Will serve to provide a smooth transition to this
15 expanded model and ensures that our current Read to
16 Learn members will continue receiving services up to
17 the transition.

18 Committee members, there is a map in your packet
19 that provides an overview of the areas of
20 concentration that the Book Club has concentrated on
21 since its inception in 2004.

22 Further discussion, questions, observations?

23 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

24 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

25 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded

1 with "aye.")

2 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

3 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

4 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

5 Resolution 2019-H: Authorization to negotiate
6 and execute a contract renewal with Grace Christian
7 Preparatory, Inc. to deliver after-school and summer
8 programming for 60 children, in an amount not to
9 exceed \$159,401.00, for a term of 12 months,
10 commencing August 1, 2019 and ending July 31, 2020
11 for year-round programming, with three remaining 12-
12 month renewals, subject to annual funding
13 appropriations.

14 May I have a motion, please?

15 MR. DUNN: So moved, Dunn.

16 THE CHAIR: Thank you. And a second?

17 MS. EYSSALLENNE: Second, Eyssallenne.

18 THE CHAIR: Thank you. Are there any recusals?

19 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

20 THE CHAIR: Moving into discussion. You'll
21 recall that in May of 2018, following a competitive
22 RFP process, the Board approved five-year funding
23 recommendations in the area of youth development,
24 after school and summer camps. Grace Christian
25 Preparatory Inc. was included in those

1 recommendations. On March 18, 2019, Grace Christian
2 Preparatory was placed on a breach of contract
3 status. You'll see a table on page 26 in your
4 packet, which outlines the breach and the findings
5 and the current status. And I'll provide an
6 overview. Breach one, failure to provide services
7 outlined in the scope of service. Was closing at
8 four rather than at 6 p.m. The program is now
9 closing at 6 p.m.

10 Second, ineffective or improper use of funds
11 allocated by the Children's Trust. Overbilling in
12 the amount of \$4,577.10. At this time, the breaches
13 have all been cured and Grace Preparatory Academy is
14 performing at the following levels: 46 children
15 enrolled, they have slots for 60, 52 percent of
16 children with disabilities, thus exceeding their
17 required amount of 30 percent.

18 In terms of their data quality issues, they're
19 classified as -- they're posted as struggling,
20 staffing is posted as advancing. Trust staff has
21 been and continues to work very closely with Grace
22 Christian Preparatory, Inc., and has been providing
23 technical assistance to this provider, and believes
24 that the program will meet contractual requirements
25 and implement its program with fidelity.

1 So with an overview of that resolution, do we
2 have further comments or questions from the
3 Committee?

4 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

5 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

6 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
7 with "aye.")

8 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

9 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

10 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

11 Resolution 2019-I: Authorization to negotiate
12 and execute a contract renewal with Opa-Locka
13 Community Development Corporation, Inc. to deliver
14 after-school and summer programming for 120 children,
15 in an amount not to exceed \$340,338.00, for a term of
16 12 months, commencing August 1, 2019 and ending July
17 31, 2020, with three remaining 12-month renewals,
18 subject to annual funding appropriations.

19 May I have a motion, please?

20 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

21 THE CHAIR: And a second?

22 MS. EYSSALLENNE: Second, Eyssallenne.

23 THE CHAIR: Thank you. Are there any recusals?

24 MR. DUNN: Possibility. I have a question as it
25 relates to recusal. Just to err on the side of

1 caution, I've been invited to sit at the table of
2 Champions by the Opa-Locka Community Development
3 Corporation, Inc. I don't know if that crosses the -
4 - I just want to be on the side of caution. I'm not
5 taking no chances.

6 MR. CLARKE: I don't believe that requires a
7 recusal.

8 MR. DUNN: Okay, just wanted to be sure.

9 THE CHAIR: No worries.

10 Committee members, a brief discussion as we move
11 into the -- a few points as we move into the
12 discussion portion. Again, referencing the early
13 reference to the May of 2018 adoption of RFPs and
14 awarding of programs, Opa-Locka was part of those
15 recommendations. However, the centers renewal was
16 delayed due to difficulty in acquiring the state
17 license from the Florida Department of Children and
18 Families. And you'll recall previous discussions
19 relating to this provider. At this time I'm happy to
20 report that our licenses have been acquired and this
21 provider has served 115 children during the 2018/2019
22 contract year. So that's on overview for you.

23 Are there any points of discussion, questions in
24 regards to this resolution?

25 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

1 Hearing none, all those in favor?

2 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
3 with "aye.")

4 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

5 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

6 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries.

7 And our final resolution for this afternoon,
8 2019-J: Authorization to execute a memorandum of
9 understanding with members of the Future Bound Miami
10 Consortium for the Children's Savings Account program
11 in Miami-Dade County.

12 May I have a motion, please?

13 MS. LEICHTER: So moved, Leichter.

14 THE CHAIR: Thank you. And a second?

15 MR. DUNN: Second, Dunn.

16 MS. DONWORTH: Recusal, Donworth.

17 THE CHAIR: Thank you. Other recusals?

18 A brief overview as we head into discussion.
19 Committee members, I'm sure you're all aware that
20 Children's Savings Accounts have been found to foster
21 educational achievement and boost a college bound
22 mindset that approves financial capability inside of
23 low and moderate families. This MOU is the final
24 piece and an ongoing work with the Children's Trust.
25 The Trust Board approved the funded collaboration

1 with Catalyst Miami to launch the Children's Saving
2 Account program in November 2018. This resolution
3 for the MOU paves the way for an establishment,
4 again, of a memorandum of understanding with the
5 Future Bound Miami Consortium, which is comprised of
6 key community stakeholders that include Catalyst
7 Miami, The Children's Trust, The City of Miami, The
8 Children's Movement, Miami-Dade County Public
9 Schools, Sant La Neighborhood Center, The United Way,
10 The Miami Foundation, The Health Foundation of South
11 Florida, and The South Florida Educational Credit
12 Union.

13 Further comments, discussion surrounding this
14 resolution?

15 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

16 THE CHAIR: Hearing none, all those in favor?

17 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
18 with "aye.")

19 THE CHAIR: Are there any opposed?

20 (NO VERBAL RESPONSE)

21 THE CHAIR: The resolution carries. That
22 concludes our resolutions for today. I'm punting to
23 Imran.

24 MR. ALI: Champions for Children, just a
25 reminder that is on Thursday, June 13th. I know most

1 of you RSVP'd. We're looking forward to having all
2 of you participate in this great event. I just
3 wanted to let the Committee know that I was told that
4 we have a goal of \$100,000 to be raised to offset the
5 cost of this event. We surpassed that goal and
6 raised \$107,000. Good work from the staff and the
7 generous donations of some of the providers,
8 including the two banks that we bank with.

9 On the 28th of June we have the Children of
10 Inmates Site Visit. There's a cap of seven visitors,
11 so we have seven already scheduled. And so we'll
12 schedule another visit if more members of the Board
13 would like to attend. Early Childhood Research
14 Demonstration Projects is scheduled for August 22nd.
15 We'll have more information on that meeting. So look
16 out for that notice and calendar invitation.

17 We have our Board Retreat scheduled for August
18 the 29th, and we look forward to having all of you
19 present at that retreat from 9:30 to 12:30. This
20 morning at our Executive meeting, we went over our
21 draft agenda, so we'll be sharing that with all of
22 you soon. Just a reminder, TRIM I and TRIM II is
23 September 9th and 16th. These are still tentative
24 dates because we have to wait for the final dates
25 from Miami-Dade County and the school board is going

1 to finalize our dates. But I just want to
2 reemphasize the importance of all Board members
3 attending the TRIM. If we don't have the necessary
4 votes, we have to postpone the meeting. And then
5 come back so that we have the necessary votes, so we
6 have a budget to function the next fiscal year. So
7 please make sure you calendar the date once we
8 finalize the dates sometime in July.

9 Chair, back to you.

10 THE CHAIR: Okay, thank you very much.

11 Thank you all for coming today. This meeting is
12 adjourned.

13 (Whereupon, at 4:02 p.m., the meeting was
14 adjourned.)


